o those of us who have no head for figures, numbers can be such a bore to work with. They are too regular and abstract, too exact in their behaviour, having no sensuous appeal. In this they stand at the farthest extreme from all things human. And yet, we can't get on without numbers. We need them to calculate, to enumerate, to identify things. No doubt, there are number-crunchers who get a kick out of working with them.

Even for the likes of us, these enigmatic figures can be livened up by a metaphoric transference of meaning. That is to say, when figures become figures of speech. Numbers can be fleshed out with a human reality. The

abstract figure then serves as a point of entry into a rich context of meaning and feeling. 'Eleventh hour' would not, then, call up the image of a spare metal pointer pointing to two upstanding strokes on the clock dial but a sense of desperate urgency, tumbled chairs and papers, strained nerves and taut muscles of last minute efforts.

It would be interesting to look at some of the figurative numbers, both ordinals and cardinals, that have gained currency because of their suggestiveness or complications of meaning. Apart from formal expressions, both British and American, slang, colloquial, humorous, informal and rude usages too, are included.
